

CONRAD LINDBLOM

Conrad Lindblom and his wife Donna, created Rocky Ridge Vegetation Control over 18 years ago. They were inspired to pioneer the use of goats for targeted browsing to restore natural environments. Conrad's expertise draws on those many years of experience with breeding (his

own special mix), transporting and herding the goats on horse with trained dogs. He brings the experience of working in diverse terrains across the province in areas such as the recent demonstrations in Chilliwack and contracts in the Cranbrook and Logan Lake areas as well as the Kamloops area.

Conrad's range of experience with addressing different kinds of weeds and invasive species include toadflax, knapweed, blackberry, Sulphur cinquefoil, buckbrush, and many others. His clients reflect as diverse a range as the terrains his goats have tackled, including BC Hydro, Ministry of Transport, several municipalities and First Nations groups.

One of Conrad's missions is to mentor young people interested in targeted and multi-species grazing in

developing their own businesses using goats. Recent examples of Conrad's support for young entrepreneurs include an initiative around Kimberley and one for the City of Calgary that is receiving significant national attention (see www.cbc.ca/news/canada/calgary/goat-herd-weed-control-calgary-park-1.3645190).
